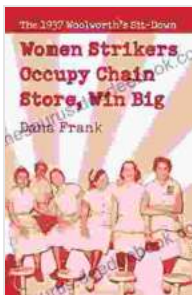


The 1937 Woolworth Sit-Down: A Pivotal Moment in the American Labor Movement

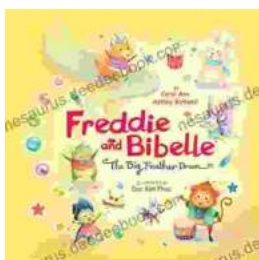
