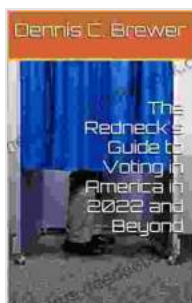

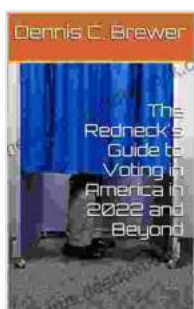
- Make sure you're registered to vote.

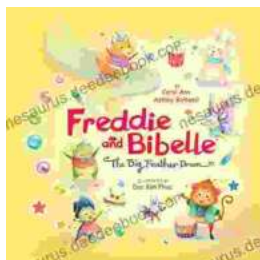
