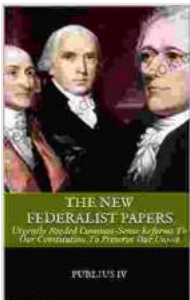


Urgently Needed Common Sense Reforms To Our Constitution To Preserve Our Union

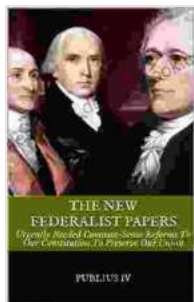

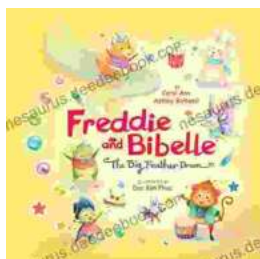
